#### Briefly, why are you applying Joint instead of as Undergraduate or Graduate only?

The Pacific Free Clinic is a joint venture between Stanford medical, graduate, and undergraduate students. Therefore, a joint application seems most appropriate to represent our volunteer base, which is approximately 50% graduate student (predominatly the medical school, but also including PhD candidates, design school students, business school students, and others) and 50% undergraduate. Our collaborations include working with the Patient Advocacy course for undergraduates, the Design School course "Design for Extreme Affordability", graduate research initiatives in the biological sciences and health policy, and business school initiatives looking at streamlining our clinic. We train both undergraduates and graduate students, have both groups on our student-run steering committee, and engage both groups in all our activities and enterprises.

Have you applied for Special Fees in the past 3 years? If so, please detail the outcome of each attempt.

No, this will be our first year applying for special fees.

# How do you plan to publicize your events/programs to the greater Stanford community? Have you registered with Events at Stanford?

16. We promote our events to the entire Stanford community. We utilize email lists with interested students, such as those of the Haas Center, pre-medical list-serves, emails to all Stanford medical students, and other health list-serves. For example, the Biological Sciences Department, the Undergraduate Advising Programs disseminates emails about the opportunities to participate in the educational and clinical experiences at the Pacific Free Clinic. We also have booths at the undergraduate activities fair, GOALIE (graduate student activities fair), the Haas Center Activities fair, and the medical student activities fair. We poster around campus for our quarterly volunteer recruitment, have t-shirts for volunteers to wear around campus and spread the word, and have quarterly volunteer information sessions to interest applications from this information session.

Our organization has held a number of recruitment events in the past to generate interest and participation in community activism at our free clinic. Specifically, we have promoted our organization's activities at graduate and undergraduate activities fairs, through email lists, flyers, and at organized events like our bimonthly health screening fairs. Besides providing our undergraduate and graduate volunteers the opportunity to serve the underserved, we also provide extensive training to all student volunteers in areas such as language interpretation, patient interviewing, and clinic operations. This educational component of our clinic's mission provides students with first-hand clinical experience within the community and constitutes a major component of our organization's mission. To further promote community health activism, we provide our student volunteers opportunities to interact with our physician volunteers through events such as BBQ cook-outs, physician-volunteer appreciation dinners, and specialty clinic events.

In order to provide these educational and public service opportunities to our graduate and undergraduate student volunteers, we are budgeting \$4,200 this year toward volunteer training, and \$5,550 toward recruitment and community outreach efforts.

### What are the three largest line item requests in your budget and why?

The three largest line item requests in our budget include the following:

- 1. Technology and Database Development \$6,000 More than 1,450 chronic care patients have come to our free clinic to seek health care services since the organization's conception and establishment in 2003. Of these, 70% continue to come into the clinic for regular, follow-up visits. Because we expect that our patient base will increase in the coming years, we see an emerging need at our clinic for the development of an electronic medical record system as well as a secure database for our volunteers to use. The money requested for this purpose will go towards the cost of server hosting, program/software development, as well as laptops needed to enter patient charts, schedule patient appointments, and carry out routine clinic functions.
- 2. General Clinic Operations Overhead Expense \$4,340 Since the clinic's founding, ~50% of our budget has gone towards providing patients with free or subsidized chronic-care medications. While we are implementing new measures to decrease our overall costs of medications (i.e. by encouraging patients to buy medications at Walmart for \$4/month or by enrolling them in RxAssist, a patient assistance program that helps patients obtain free or low-cost medications), we still face the challenge of providing our patients, many of whom have chronic illnesses, with much needed medications. Being able to provide this service is key to our clinic's philosophy and model of care.
- 3. Public Relations Marketing Copies & Dip; amp; amp; Print Expenses \$3 900

In order to increase visibility of clinic services and events within the community, our clinic has been producing quarterly newsletters and brochures that are distributed widely to students and physicians within the Stanford community as well as to community residents within all of Santa Clara county. In addition to keeping our communities informed of the clinic's activities, the newsletters also serve as a means for us to maintain important community contacts as well as to recruit new volunteers and interested community partners to join our efforts.

### What is the average attendance at your events?

PFC typically has 35 volunteers each Saturday for our primary care clinic. This includes 1 student manager, 6 student coordinators, 6 medical student patient advocates, 6 undergraduate/community patient advocates, 1 ultrasound student, 2 screening students, 5 health educators, 6 medical interpreters, and 2 physicians. At our screening events, we have on average 10 volunteers seeing approximately 200 members of the community. Our annual volunteer appreciation dinner has approximately 200 people in attendance and our student-physician BBQ had approximately 40 people attend. We had approximately 50 people attend our physician recruitment brunch.

### What is your total membership?

Pacific Free Clinic has a total membership of 300 volunteers, including 100 Stanford medical students, 100 Stanford undergraduates, 43 Stanford affiliates, 55 community members, and 20 volunteer physicians. Each Saturday at clinic, we have 35 volunteers assist in patient care and clinic operations. We also have special community screening events with additional volunteers.

#### What percentage of your total membership is undergraduate? Graduate?

PFC has 50% of its volunteers as undergraduates and 50% as graduate students, the majority of those being medical students but also including students in the biochemistry, biological sciences, and computer sciences departments.

### What events/programs does your group hold throughout the year for the Stanford Community?

All of PFC's events are focused on the Stanford community and engaging students interested in health care in underserved communities. We provide training for medical interpreters, patient advocates (undergraduates interested in learning how to perform a medical history), health educators, and ultrasound students throughout the year. We seek to raise awareness on campus of underserved medical communities and the needs of those groups. We are partnering with the California Medical Association to raise awareness on campus and the community about Antibiotic Resistance through the AWARE program, and we are partnering with the Stanford Student Chapter of the American Medical Association to put on a program this April entitled & amp; quot; Faces of the Uninsured& quot; to raise awareness about the uninsured. We seek to connect students interested in medicine with current physicians for informal advising at social BBQs and other events. We also train all first year Stanford medical students on how to perform blood draws, finger sticks, BP checks, PPD placement. We serve as the clinical practicum site for Med 227: Bedside Ultrasound along with a clinical site for the Patient Advocacy course for undergraduates. We also served as one of three sites for the Design School course "Design for Extreme Affordability" and the course & amp; quot; Med 283: Early Clinical Experience at Pacific Free Clinic."

## What is the fundamental goal/purpose of your VSO (please limit your response to 50-100 words)?

PFC has a three-fold mission:

- To provide free health care services in a culturally appropriate manner for adults in East San Jose with low-income, no insurance, and/or low English proficiency
- To overcome barriers that contribute to health disparities by providing interpretation services in Vietnamese, Spanish, and Mandarin
- To educate Stanford community members on culturally competent care and provide students with an opportunity gain experience in community medicine

## What percentage of your beneficiaries are (explain basis or how this was determined) graduates and undergraduates?

50% of our beneficiaries are graduate students (predominantly medical students) while the remaining 50% of our beneficiaries are our undergraduate members. This is based primarily on the make-up of our volunteer base which is split fairly evenly between the two groups. Training, clinical education, as well as the opportunity to serve is provided to all volunteers who participate.

## When and why was your VSO established (please limit your response to 50-100 words)?

A few years ago, some Stanford medical students discovered through a series of surveys that a large percentage of individuals in Santa Clara County lacked regular healthcare because they could not afford it and/or they could not speak English. In May 2003, PFC opened its doors to provide primary healthcare services to this community without discrimination. At the time, PFC focused mainly on increasing access to healthcare within the Asian community by training volunteers to provide culturally competent care particularly for this population. Since then, PFC has expanded its services to the Spanish-speaking communities.

### Why are you requesting Special Fees?

PFC is requesting the amount listed on our budget in order to continue our three-fold mission of service to the community, focusing on culturally-competent care, and educating students about health care. As a student run organization dealing with the formidable task of providing access to free health care for underserved immigrant population and simultaneously offering students an educational experience in the dissemination of health care, PFC is financially disadvantaged. The ASSU Special Fees appropriations would help make the clinic financially sound to continue its operations of providing Stanford students and community members continued access to community service.
