QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Have you applied for Special Fees in the past 3 years? If so, please detail the outcome of each attempt.

Yes. Last year we received 99% of our requested amount. In the two previous years, we received our requested amounts.

If you applied for Special Fees last year, is there an increase in the amount you're seeking this year? If so, why?

Yes, we are asking for slightly over \$5,000 more than last year. This is primarily due to a significant rise in recent years in costs associated with our annual Big Speaker event, despite our very best efforts to contain expenses. Moreover, this year SIG ceased receiving an annual grant from The Stanford Fund, on which we had relied heavily for support in the past. Finally, note that SIG's Special Fees budget has remained stagnant for at least five years. It seems that inflation alone would merit an increase.

Please define the services provided by your group with the Special Fee, as per the ASSU Constitution:

The receipt of Special Fees will allow Stanford in Government (SIG) to host regular events with Stanford faculty and visiting fellows which will open political discussion to the Stanford community. They will also allow SIG to bring contemporary and influential speakers to campus through co-sponsorship with other campus organizations and, most especially, through SIG's own Big Speaker event in the spring.

What are the three largest line item requests in your budget and why?

The three largest line items in Stanford in Government's 2009-2010 budget are: 1) Honoraria Fees (6310) for Big Speaker. Big Speaker is Stanford in Government's largest event of the year in terms of audience, speaker caliber, and planning effort. For example, this year's Big Speaker with former Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf was attended by nearly 2,000 students in Memorial Auditorium. In this event, we strive to bring relevant and important political figures to campus. Speakers of this caliber command a high fee, and along with co-sponsorship from its traditional partner ASSU Speakers Bureau, it is through Special Fees that Stanford in Government (SIG) is able to afford these speakers. SIG's honorarium budget for Big Speaker has not been increased for several years, and we feel that an increase this year is justified in light of escalating speaking costs. Big Speaker is SIG's primary event and the securing of an inspiring speaker is key to the success of the event. 2) Technical Services (6320) for Operating Expenses and Big Speaker. These funds allow SIG to provide the appropriate AV for all events, including those that are co-sponsored with other organizations. More importantly, with the development of iTunesU, this fund allows SIG to record all of its major programming and post it to iTunes, allowing those from the Stanford community (and beyond) who could not attend any given event to see and enjoy it on video. 3) Co-sponsorship Expenses (7020) for Various Speakers. SIG works with a wide variety of campus organizations to bring diverse speakers to campus. In the recent past, SIG has teamed with ASSU Speakers Bureau, the NAACP, FACES, STAND, SPOON, The Roosevelt Institute, FACEAIDS, and the Stanford Law School. Co-sponsorship allows SIG to help bring important speakers to campus as well as stimulating exciting partnerships with our fellow student groups.

How do you plan to publicize your events/programs to the greater Stanford community? Have you registered with Events at Stanford?

Stanford in Government uses a combination of electronic fliers, distributed through university lists, as well as the SIG Friends list, which reaches approximately 850 members of the Stanford community, and physical fliers posted around campus. We also use Facebook advertisements for events. Our weekly news summaries in the Daily also serve as forms of advertisement. This year, we began a weekly PEAS (Policy Events at Stanford) email that lists the 5 or so most exciting events for that week. We also regularly post on Events@Stanford.

What events/programs does your group hold throughout the year for the Stanford Community?

Stanford in Government (SIG) provides a large variety of programming to the Stanford community. Under the umbrellas of different committees, these events all work toward expanding the political awareness and engagement of the community. The Campus Awareness committee hosts bi-weekly policy lunches, gathering esteemed faculty and visiting fellows together with students to discuss and debate current policy. In the past two years, topics ranged from the importance of the West in the upcoming general election to a skeptic's view of global warming to Obama's most pressing foreign policy challenges. Through its dedication to nonpartisanship, SIG is able to bring together faculty and students of all political stripes, allowing for lively and open debate. The Public Policy Forum, another of SIG's committees, sets up multidisciplinary panels on key current events - a recent example is the "A Post-Election Analysis from A Media Perspective" event hosted in December 2008 with acclaimed journalist Michael Crowley. This committee is also responsible for Big Speaker, SIG's main event, which brings important and influential political personages to campus to share their expertise and political insider's eye with the Stanford community. Additionally, each summer we organize events and speakers for all Stanford interns in DC. SIG's Fellowships Program offers between thirty and forty summer internship opportunities for students to work in public service. Fellows are placed in local, national, and international government branches and NGOs. SIG has established relationships with its host organizations and we work to ensure that fellows will engage in substantial activities throughout the summer. Fellows are also given a stipend of \$4000, funded through endowments that are administered by the Haas Center for Public Service. Stanford students can apply to our fellowships during the winter quarter by first submitting a written application, complete with an essay and faculty recommendations. For each fellowship, five students will be selected for a final round interview, which will be conducted by members of SIG, the past fellow, and the faculty advisor for that fellowship. Selections are announced before the end of winter guarter - we are currently in the process of collecting this year's applications. On a side note, SIG is offering at least 5 new fellowships this year. Finally, SIG's Campus and Community Partnerships Committee seeks to bring together Stanford students and the larger Stanford community in the effort to spread political awareness and education. In the past, Campus and Community Partnerships has helped prepare Stanford workers for their citizenship tests. Last year, it expanded its geographic reach to include East Palo Alto, where it taught a civic education course to eighth graders in the East Palo Alto Charter School. An additional program included a course for high school seniors focused on voting rights and the electoral process, with the aim of contributing to the education of the growing (and new) voting population in this year's important general election. CCP continued its work last fall by teaching a weekly voter education series to East Palo Alto residents. In the spring, CCP will facilitate a lunchtime know-your-rights citizenship course for ESL Stanford employees.

What is the average attendance at your events?

Typically a large, speaker event garners between 150 and 250 students. Policy lunches have on average between 25 and 30 attendees; Hoover Media Fellow Lunches have between 10 and 15. Other panel discussions and events usually have between 30 and 70 attendees, depending on the topic and venue. Big Speaker has around 2,000 and Medium Speakers garner around 400 students, faculty, community members.

Why are you requesting Special Fees?

Stanford in Government (SIG) is recognized in the Stanford community for its extensive programming, as well as its fellowships program, which provides 35 fully funded summer internships around the world to deserving undergraduates. Stanford Department of Political Science Professor Larry Diamond recently commented that SIG "is one of the most vital and exciting programs" on campus. Through its dedications to nonpartisan political awareness, SIG is able to bring together students and faculty members of every political stripe with educational and informative events. Whether through lunches where Stanford students get that chance to discuss and debate policy with esteemed professors and fellows, or panels of thoughtfully chosen speakers, SIG strives to deepen the political understanding of the Stanford community. The annual Big Speaker event - the main event in SIG's year - has in recent years brought former Senator John Edwards, former Sec. of State Madeleine Albright, and former Pakastani President Pervez Musharraf to Stanford. We are currently making arrangements for a large speaker in the Spring. To continue this tradition of broadly stimulating campus programming, Stanford in Government is requesting Special Fees.

Expenses for the event routinely fall between \$40,000 and \$80,000. SIG works closely with other campus partners to raise additional funds for this event. This year's Big Speaker event with former Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf was attended by nearly 2,000 students in Memorial Auditorium. The event was covered by over 1,000 national and international news outlets. Ten co-sponsoring organizations joined SIG and Speakers Bureau to facilitate this event. Previous Big Speakers include Madeleine Albright, John Edwards, Ehud Barak, and Janet Reno. SIG works extremely hard to maintain a responsible budget for Big Speaker, almost always negotiating a steep reduction in speaking fees. However, speaking fees and related costs for major speakers have increased rapidly in recent years, while SIG's honorarium for Big Speaker has remained constant for the past several years. Moreover, SIG has traditionally supplemented its Big Speaker honorarium with funding from the The Stanford Fund; SIG no longer receives this TSF funding as the result of the agreement expiring. As a result, SIG has not been able to fulfill its equal partnership with Speakers Bureau.
